

Participant Information Sheet – Community informant group

Project Title: Civic Sinoburbia? New Chinese migrants and everyday citizenship in Sydney

Project Summary:

You are invited to participate in a research study being conducted by Associate Professor Shanthi Robertson, Distinguished Professor Ien Ang, Professor Megan Watkins, Dr Bonnie Pang and Dr Alexandra Wong (Institute for Culture and Society) and Associate Professor Christina Ho (University of Technology Sydney).

Australia has seen a large influx of China-born migrants in the past few decades. Large numbers of them have taken up residency in various Sydney suburbs. This project aims to examine how new Chinese migrants participate in everyday civic life in three suburbs where they make up almost a third of the population. Focussing on five domains in everyday local civic life (i.e. education, culture, sports, religion and community services), this project looks at the opportunities and barriers that may affect their participation and how local civic organisations adapt to their growing presence in the areas. The findings from this project will generate new knowledge on the local impacts of new Chinese migration, which can help inform multicultural policies and enhance local social cohesion in Australia.

How is the study being paid for?

The research is funded by the Australian Research Council Discovery Grant.

What will I be asked to do?

You will be asked to

- 1) give consent for us to conduct field observation at your venue or organisation for 1 hour
- 2) attend an interview with us to talk about the participation of the Chinese community at your venue or organisation. The interview will be audio recorded

How much of my time will I need to give?

We expect the interview will take approximately 45 mins to 1 hour.

What benefits will I, and/or the broader community, receive for participating?

You will not receive any direct benefits (e.g. in the form of reimbursement) from being in the study. However, we expect that the study will benefit you and the community at large by generating new knowledge on how new Chinese migrants participate in local civic life in suburbs and assisting local governments and organisations in responding more effectively to the demographic change in the suburbs. The research will also provide insights for the multicultural policies and contribute to local community cohesion in Australia.

Will the study involve any risk or discomfort for me? If so, what will be done to rectify it?

We do not expect that there will be any risk or discomfort for you to take part in this study. The field observation and interview will be carried out by experienced researchers who are well equipped to respond with different situation and location with sensitivity. If you feel any discomfort during our field observation or interview, you may request the researchers to stop the research activity or negotiate another time for the visit.

How do you intend to publish or disseminate the results?

It is anticipated that the results of this research project will be published and/or presented in a variety of forums. In any publication and/or presentation, the information will be provided in such a way that the participant cannot be identified, except with your permission. We will use pseudonyms for all participants involved, and no personal information about you will be reported in a way that reveals your identity.

Will the data and information that I have provided be disposed of?

Please be assured that only the researchers will have access to the raw data you provide. However, your data may be used in other related projects for an extended period of time. All data collected for this project will be retained for five years after publication. After five years, the data and information that you have provided will be securely disposed of.

Can I withdraw from the study?

Participation is entirely voluntary and you are not obliged to be involved. If you do participate, you can withdraw at any time without giving a reason. To withdraw from the study, you should contact one of the researchers.

If you do choose to withdraw, any information that you have supplied, including interview sound recordings and transcripts will be securely disposed of.

Can I tell other people about the study?
